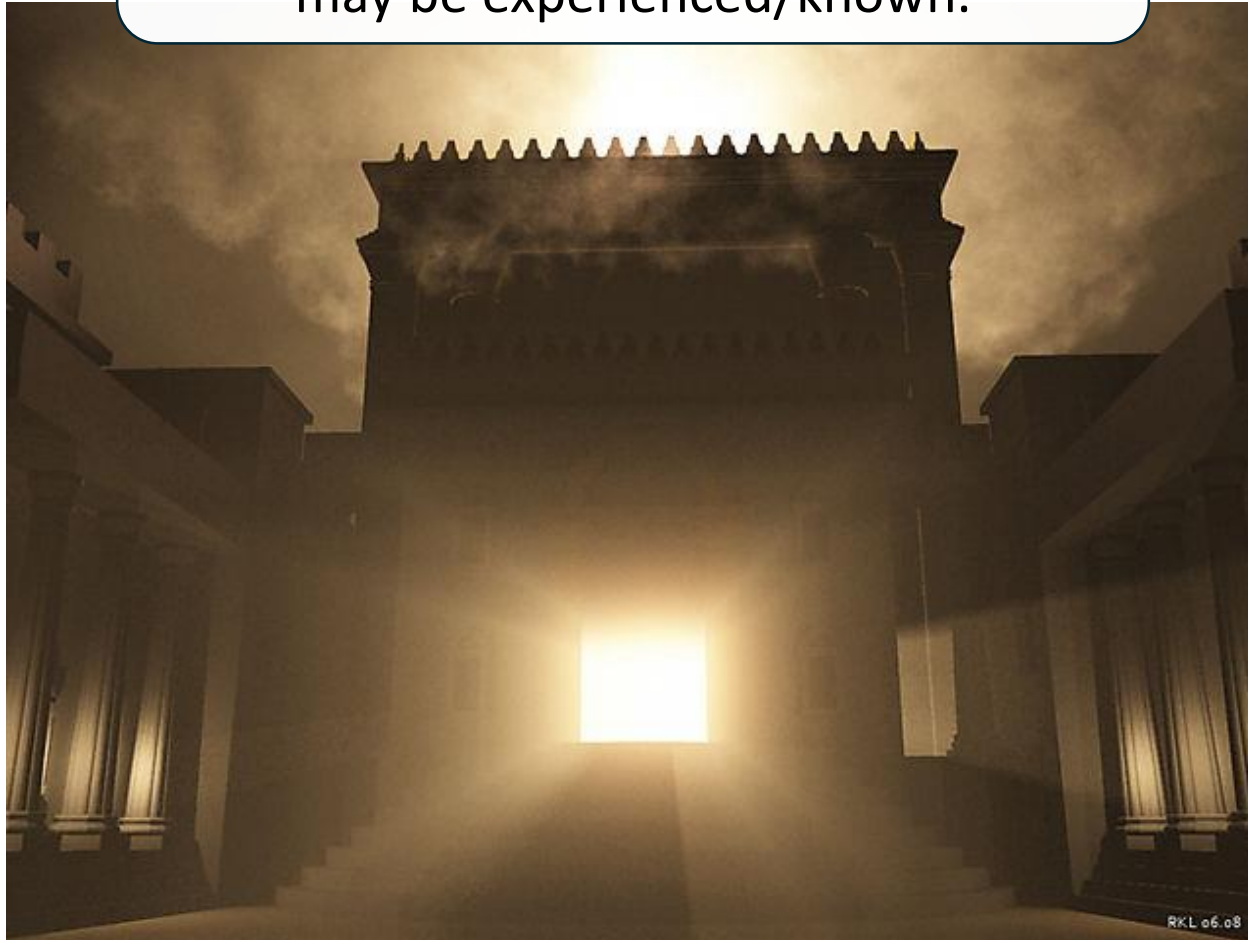
Shechinah: Belief that God is beyond human understanding but his presence may be experienced/known.
