

## **Rites of Passage**

Over the half term, you need to study two areas for your PPE that we will not cover in class.

You must know the **four Rites of Passage**, which are the main stages of Jewish life:

- **Brit Milah** – Birth
- **Bar Mitzvah / Bat Mitzvah** – Adulthood
- **Marriage** – Commitment
- **Mourning** – Death

Rites of passage are stages in life that every religion recognises.

You will find these in your **Practices Revision Guide** on **pages 29–41**.

1. **Read the “Need to Know” and “What the Examiner is Looking For” sections.**  
It’s vital that your revision guide covers this information.
2. **Go to page 3 of your booklet**, where you’ll find a **checklist**.  
The checklist is broken down into **State, Explain, and Evaluate**.  
This will help you make your guide relevant to the style of exam questions you’ll be asked.

Each revision guide should include:

- At least **three key teachings**

- An explanation of **what happens, why it happens**, and the **evidence or source** that supports it
- **Bible or Tenakh references** and what they mean
- **Jewish practice and symbolism**, explaining how each rite expresses Jewish beliefs

Use the checklist to make sure your revision guide includes everything — then tick off each section once complete so you can check your understanding after revising
